- 1. **Criteria for Evaluation:** The evaluation process for 4-H projects will include:
  - a. An interview with a judge(s):
  - b. Exhibition of a project item and/or educational display;
  - c. A completed project book;
  - d. For more information, please check each division under this department, the 4-H Pre-Fair Packet and /or the *Franklin County 4-H Project Requirement Guide*.
- 2. Criteria for 4-H Project Items/Displays: A project item includes item(s) made, constructed, created, produced, grown and/or designed by the exhibitor based on project guidelines and requirements. An educational display may be a poster, exhibit board, mobile, model, collage, kit, storyboard, or other creative presentation of project work unless otherwise noted in the *Franklin County 4-H Project Requirement Guide*. A project book does not constitute a project item, exhibit, and/or display.
- **3.** Evaluation Ribbons for 4-H Projects: Blue, Red and White ribbons are based on judge's interview and review of the project book.
- **4. Superior, Outstanding and Honorable Mention Awards for 4-H Projects:** Superior, Outstanding and Honorable Mention ribbons will be awarded at the discretion of the judge.
- **5. Age Requirements:** Projects marked *Junior & Senior* are separated into age divisions depending on the project according to the Ohio State Fair requirements. ALL ages are as of January 1 of the current year.
- **6. Evaluation Check-In Time:** 4-H members should arrive approximately 5-10 minutes prior to their scheduled project evaluation judging time to complete check-in procedures. For complete check-in procedures and times, review the 4-H Pre-Fair Packet. In the weeks prior to the fair, members will select an appointment time for their evaluation.
- 7. Special Awards for 4-H Projects: Best of Class/Show, State Fair Selection, and State Fair Alternate selections are explained under each division. Only members with completed project books, who receive a blue ribbon are eligible for State Fair Selection, State Fair Alternate, Honorable Mention, or Best of Class/Show Awards. Members who participate in makeup evaluations are not eligible to receive these awards.
- **8. Awards Ceremony:** Blue, Red, and White ribbons will be presented at the conclusion of the interview. State Fair Selection, State Fair Alternate, Honorable Mention, or Best of Class/Show and other awards will be presented later that day at a time designated in the Junior Fair schedule.

- **201D You and Your Dog Projects:** Evaluated at the Dog Show prior to the fair. See the Junior Fair Dogs department information.
- Rabbit and Cavy Projects: Animals are not required to come to the fair due to possible heat stress on the animal. The decision to bring the animal to the evaluation at the fair is left to the owner. No points will be deducted for not having the animal present.
- \* Other Requirements: All small animals must be in the continual care of the Junior Fair Exhibitor on or before May 1.

#### **%** Cat Requirements:

- O Cats must be a minimum of 15 weeks old by the day of evaluations. Kittens less than 15 weeks are not permitted at evaluations.
- Cats must be immunized against Feline Panleukopenia (FPL), Feline Viral rhinotracheitis (FVR) and Feline Calicivirus (FCV) OR vaccinated according to the veterinarian's vaccination protocol. All cats MUST be immunized against Rabies. All vaccinations must be current through the day of evaluations and given by a licensed, accredited veterinarian.
- Proof of vaccinations must be on the County Companion Animal Day Certificate of Vaccination for Cats and Ferrets and signed by a licensed, accredited veterinarian.
- \* Ferret Requirements: Ferrets must be immunized against Rabies and Canine Distemper, OR according to the veterinarian's vaccination protocol. All vaccinations must be current through July 23, 2023 and given by a licensed, accredited veterinarian.
  - o Proof of vaccinations must be on the County Companion Animal Day Certificate of Vaccination for Cats and Ferrets and signed by a licensed, accredited veterinarian.

- Modeling Awards Criteria: A modeling award will be given to a Junior and an Intermediate/Senior 4-H Clothing Project. Judging is based on poise, style, and garment presentation. Modeling Award age divisions: Junior (8-11 years old), Intermediate/Senior (12-18 years old) as of January 1 of the current year.
- \*\* Construction Awards Criteria: A construction award will be given to a Junior and an Intermediate/Senior 4-H Clothing Project. Selection is based on the judge's inspection of clothing construction during evaluations. Construction Award age division: Junior (8-11 years old), Intermediate/Senior (12-18 years old) as of January 1 of the current year.

- Be prepared to participate in a planned menu activity utilizing MyPlate. <a href="www.myplate.gov">www.myplate.gov</a>
- \*Be prepared to answer five questions on any nutrition facts or other project information contained in the project book.
- Representation Project Portfolio (This replaces the educational display component.) The "Presentation Project" is a project specific to the participant's book. The participant will be responsible for bringing a 3-pronged folder that includes 8.5 x 11 pages. The participants will create a maximum of one page (one-sided only) per "activity area" or "interest area" as designated in the front of their project books. These pages could be in collage, journaling, timeline, photo, or any other format that would illustrate the work and knowledge of the participant. Each page could be different or could a combination of styles allowing the 4-Her to reflect on their learning experience. **There will be no points for scrapbooking style**. The portfolios will be judged on the inclusion of information about the interest or activity areas listed in the front of each book, the organization of materials, verbal presentation, and communication with the judge regarding their portfolio.

- 1. **Eligibility:** Any 4-H member is eligible to participate in the Public Speaking Event. All participants should follow the Guidelines for State Fair 4-H Communication Day Event.
- 2. **Entry Requirements:** Members must complete their fair entry.
- 3. **Age Divisions:** See the classes above for age requirements. All age classifications are age as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year.
- 4. **These Items May Not Be Used For Public Speaking:** The following items may not be used for Illustrated Talks or Demonstrations: Large animals (horse, beef, sheep, goat, dairy or hogs over 20 pounds). Instead, members should use models, photographs, or illustrations to make their point when giving a talk about large animals. No firearms, bows, arrows and weapons. Plastic replicas are permitted but we urge caution in the use of items that look truly authentic in that they may create concerns with Fair Security and may not be permitted on the grounds.
- 5. **Items That Can Be Used:** Animals under the weight of 20 pounds may be used in a demonstration; provided that the animals do not place the public at risk and that meet all of the health requirements established by the Ohio State Fair Health Regulations. Current health and shot records must be carried with the animal. Animals must remain caged or leashed before and after the presentation.
- 6. **Presentation Requirements:** All work is to be original work created by the 4-H member(s) for 4-H Club work. Members using computer generated or other Audio/Visual Equipment must bring their own equipment. Screen and Projector will be provided.

#### A. Illustrated Talk/Demonstration w/out use of Technology:

- 1. May use charts, posters, pictures
- 2. No PowerPoint or computer-generated messages

#### B. Illustrated Talk or Demonstration with OR without use of Computer Technology:

- I. Presenter uses appropriate props and/or computer-generated visual aides to teach others about a subject or how to do something.
  - 2. Use of computer-generated visuals is NOT required. For example:
    - a. A demonstration may be delivered in this category. PowerPoint type slides may be added in addition to other props to help present their message.
    - b. An Illustrated Talk may be delivered in this category, with the members (s) using PowerPoint type technology to present all or part of the visual message: must be accompanied by live narration.
  - 3. Requires live speech delivered along with any PowerPoint or poster message. (No prerecorded narration)

#### 7. **Required Time Lengths:**

- A. Junior Classes must be 5-8 minutes in length
- B. Intermediate and Senior Classes: must be 5-8 minutes in length
- 8. **Marketing Classes**: Members do not accompany these entries to Judging.
  - A. **Original Thank You Card** with artwork on the cover, inside message is not required. Use of the 4-H emblem is required. One entry per member. Card should be on 8 ½ x 11 white card stock folded once. Art and message must be the original work of the member. Member may use any medium. Computer graphics are permitted only in classes where indicated if they are the original work of the member, no commercially designed clip art may be used. The 4-H emblem must be used correctly. See:

    <a href="http://www.nation4hheadquarters.gov/emblem/4h\_name.htm">http://www.nation4hheadquarters.gov/emblem/4h\_name.htm</a> for guidelines. Members name, age, and county should be printed neatly in the lower right-hand corner of the back of the card.
  - B. **Original Holiday Card** with artwork on the cover. An inside message is not required, but may be included at the discretion of the designer. Inside messages will not be judged. Use of the 4-H emblem is strongly encouraged, but not required. Card should be on 8 1/2 x 11 white cardstock, folded once. Art and message must be the original work of the member. Member may use any medium, including crayon, chalk, pen and ink, pencil, markers, etc. Designs must be hand-lettered and drawn or cut by hand. When using 4-H logo that is downloaded it must go into the graphics division. No commercially designed clipart may be used. These designs must be able to be duplicated. Member's name, age, and *county* should be neatly printed in the lower right-hand corner of the back of the card. Evaluation will be based on the quality, creativity, and originality of the design. By submitting an entry, you give the 4-H Foundation the rights to use the chosen cards as the 4-H Foundation's official Holiday Cards. The cards will display the 4-H member's first initial and last name.
  - C. **Promotional video:** This is a video "short" that promotes a county or the state 4-H project or program or some aspect of that project or program, such as junior fair, camp, etc. Only one entry per member. This must be a fully automated, stand-alone video presentation with sound and narration as appropriate. Think "YouTube." The video should include recorded visual, sound, and narration to convey a message. The video should be the original work of the member making the entry. Use of copyrighted or protected characters, logos, or music is not permitted, with the exception of the 4-H emblem. The 4-H

emblem must be used correctly. See http://www.national4-hheadquarters.gov/emblem/4h\_name.htm for guidelines. Images in the video should be appropriate for promoting 4-H. Use pictures of youth who are of 4-H age; when possible, show the diversity of membership, projects, and activities; show youth exercising appropriate safety practices (i.e. wearing helmets on horseback). The video should be 2-4 minutes long. Penalties may be assessed for videos less than 2 minutes or longer than 4 minutes. Videos must be shared with the Extension office by sending the link via email to Rachel Stoneburner (Stoneburner.31@osu.edu). The video must play using QuickTime Player or Windows Media Player.
